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

What To Know: School Start Window

Timeframe

Last Friday in September

Data Reporting Requirements

Report key enrollment statuses, leaver codes, and other essential data

Compliance and Accuracy

Verifying accurate and complete data

Leaver Codes and Underreported Students

Identify students previously enrolled who did not return.

Enter appropriate leaver codes to avoid underreported

Encourage continuers to reenroll

Impact on Accountability

Data can influence graduation rates, dropout rates, data validation reporting



Each student served in a district in one school year must be accounted for the next fall through the TEA



A continuer is a student who at the end of their expected graduation year has not graduated and is enrolled by the school start window. These students are not considered dropouts because they continue their education beyond the traditional four-year graduation timeline.



A leaver code should be entered by the close of the school start window if a student does not return or does not enroll in another Texas public school.




A student will appear on a district's Underreported Student listing if a leaver record was not submitted for a student served by the district the prior year who did not return by the end of the school start window the following year and did not:

- · Enroll in another Texas public school
- Previously graduated from a Texas public school, or
- Receive a Texas Certificate of High School Equivalency (TxCHSE) by August 31.

Graduation Rates and Accountability

Graduation rates are included in the A—F accountability system and the Results-Driven Accountability System.

- The Student Achievement Domain uses the best of the four-year, five-year, or sixyear state graduation rate.
- The Closing the Gaps Domain uses the four-year **federal graduation rate**.
- The four-year **federal graduation rate** is evaluated in RDA.
- The **annual dropout rate** (7-12) is also evaluated in RDA for each program.





Class of 2023 District Graduation Summary for Dallas ISD, District Number 057905

In 2019-20, there were **11,676** brand new ninth graders^a in our district. In spring 2023, you would want to see **11,676** students wearing caps and gowns, right?

Our community's expectation is that most of our new Grade 9 students from 2019-20 will be high school graduates in 2022-23. However, over the next three years, students moved in, and students moved out. We expected the students who moved in, if they started Grade 9 at the same time as the rest of our Grade 9 students, to graduate in spring 2023 as the class of 2023.

Over the next three years, **1,868** students from the class of 2023 left us and enrolled in other Texas districts. Over that same time, **1,198** students joined our district and became part of the class of 2023.


Adjusting for students who left and who came in, you would expect **11,006** students to have graduated in spring 2023. Did they?


By spring 2023, 8,187 students had graduated from our district. What happened to the other 2,819 students?

Three hundred seventy-seven students were still attending school in our district, and the rest had left our district. Where did the other 2,442 students go?

- 821 students left our district for other reasons; of these,
 - 317 enrolled in schools in other states;
 - 58 began home schooling;
 - 327 returned to their home countries;
 - 90 enrolled in Texas private schools;
 - o 0 were attending and were withdrawn when the district discovered that the student was not entitled to enrollment in the district;
 - o 0 enrolled in college early to pursue a degree;
 - 6 were removed by Child Protective Services;
 - 19 died;
 - 3 had earned a high school equivalency certificate outside of Texas while not enrolled in Texas public schools;
 - 1 were graduates from outside Texas who entered Texas public schools and left;
 - 0 enrolled in a university high school diploma program;
 - 0 were expelled for criminal behavior and could not return;
 - o were graduates from another state under provisions of the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children;
- 19 students earned Texas Certificates of High School Equivalency (TxCHSE);
- 1,486 tudents dropped out; and
 - **116** students were unable to be tracked in the system because of possible reporting errors.


State Individual Graduation Committee (IGC) Rates








Region 4 by the Numbers: IGC

Consider implementing IGC best practices



If not in compliance, TEA recommends implementing any corrective actions or improvements to current IGC policies or procedures for the 2024-2025 school year.



SDRU will continue to issue compliance reviews related to IGCs with the expectation that all LEAs will be in compliance by the start of the 2024-2025 school year.

Texas Education Code §29.003(a)(15), permits the commissioner to authorize a special investigation to be conducted when 10 percent or more of the students graduating in a particular school year from a particular high school campus are awarded a diploma based on the determination of an individual graduation committee.

If a campus is identified as not following IGC requirements and is graduating students who have not met graduation requirements, these data could also impact the state accountability system (TEC §39.003(a)(14)).





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
